Following the ceremony, there was a reception, and the young people received the congratulations of the guests. Two hundred and fifty persons were present at the reception, some coming from Mount Joy, Philadelphia, Reading, Lancaster, Media, Pa., East Orange, N. J., New York City, New Haven, Conn., Belmont, Taunton, Boston, Lynn, Swampscott, Salem and Nahant, Mass.

A caterer's launch was served in a large booth on the lawn, and during the reception, an orchestra played. The lawn and veranda of the Strout homestead were superbly decorated, and the elaborate decorations in the house were duplicated on the lawn. Two large elm trees in the grounds were strung with a myriad of red, white and blue electric lights, and these twinkling amid the leaves formed a very pretty spectacle.

The groom's gift to the bride was a brooch of sapphires and pearls, and to the best man and ushers, he presented silver key rings. To the maid of honor, the bride gave a signet ring, and to the bridesmaids and flower girls, she presented daisy pins. To the pianist who rendered the selections during the marriage ceremony, the wedding march, the bride presented a daisy brooch.
