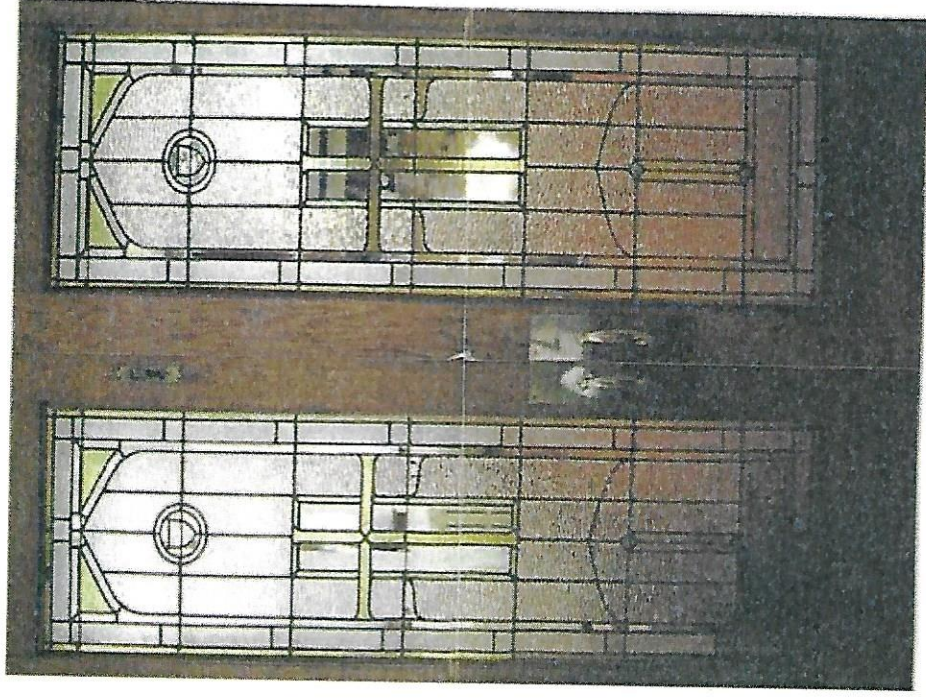


WILLIAM OTTERBEIN AND MARTIN BOEHM

William Otterbein and Martin Boehm appear in the glass window in the center of the rear of the sanctuary. On the right front of the window are the words: "By Their Fruits Shall We Know Them. Their Blessings Shall Live After Them." The names of the two clergymen are the words of the movement which became the United Methodist Church in Christ church.

William Otterbein was born in 1726 at Dillenburg, Germany. In 1752 he came to America as a pastor. After serving several churches, he founded a church in Baltimore, Maryland, known today as the Otterbein Church, where he served for forty years.

Martin Boehm was born in 1767 in a small town in Pennsylvania. He served as a minister of the Methodist Church in the western part of the state. While he was in the western part of the state, he was in Chester County in 1767, where he met and embraced him, and he became a member of the German-speaking Methodist Church in Christ Church, where he became St. Mark's



At the four entrances of the sanctuary are etched glass doors, with a symbol of a cross in the center of each door. They were donated by Christian H. Herr, his wife, and Eunice Herr his daughter; Anna Beamesderfer; W. E. Hoffman and his wife in memory of Samuel S. Royer; and Frank and Emma Watson.

Over each of the two doors, at the back of the sanctuary, are three smaller windows. They were given by Willis I. Greenawalt; C. D. Carson and wife; the James Glatfelter family; Warren H. and Elsie W. Bentzel; Isaac W. Bentzel and his wife; and A. I. Shank and his wife.

In addition to the windows in the sanctuary there are other stained art glass windows. They are around the rear of the sanctuary, in the stairwells, upstairs classrooms, library and welcome center. They do not portray Biblical scenes or symbols as do those in the sanctuary. They were given by Ezra W. and Minnie B. Newcomer and their daughters, Ethel and Beatrice; the Wee Sisters class; the Good Cheer class; Victor Fogie; the Loyal Sons class; the King's Daughter's class; P. K. and Margaret Strickler; S. S. Stacks and his daughter Elizabeth; Susan Ream; William Butterwick; Marlin Hauer; B. Frank and Mrs. Watson; Christian H. Jr. and Minnie Herr and their daughter Eunice; and in memory of the Rev.
