**Five Mount Joy  
Residents Hurt**

TWO ARE PATIENTS IN THE  
CHAMBERSBURG HOSPITAL  
AFTER AN AUTOMOBILE  
CRASH SUNDAY

Those in the hospital are: Mrs. Oliver K. Greenawalt, who suffers from internal injuries and from shock; Mrs. John Moore, a deep cut on the head which required five stitches and injuries to her back. John Moore received a cut in the head and had several ribs broken. Oliver Greenawalt suffers three broken ribs, and Virginia Greenawalt severe bruises. They were removed to their homes for treatment. One of the young men in the Utah car was treated at the hospital for a laceration of the knee.

The car driven by Moore was coming out of the park when the accident happened. They were accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Greenawalt, Clara Greenawalt, of Mt. Joy, and Miss Dorothy Kessler, of Lancaster, who occupied another machine in the rear. Clara Greenawalt, who is a trained nurse is attending the injured who were removed to the hospital. They are said to be resting well. Both cars are badly damaged.

**MR. L. PERCY HEILIG IN  
AN AUTO COLLISION**

Mr. L. Percy Heilig, who resides on West Donegal street, and is employed as a salesman by the Shock Independent Oil Co., of town, met with a bad accident early yesterday morning.

He was on his way to Maytown and the frost which accumulated on the windshield made driving difficult. He did not notice an approaching milk truck going in the opposite direction. Neither did the truck driver see Mr. Heilig in time. Both cars turned out and Heilig's Ford ran square into the side of the truck.

Mr. Heilig's left arm was fractured above the elbow, he sustained a number of cuts about the head and a deep gash on his left thigh. Dr. A. F. Snyder, of town, attended him after which he was removed to the General Hospital, at Lancaster. His Ford was damaged considerably. The accident occurred on the Donegal road near Maytown.
